classified by purpose

4 purposes

Declarative: makes a statement or a declaration

Chocolate is delicious.

Imperative: used to command or request

I want more chocolate now. Ummmmm, I mean: Please get me chocolate.

Interrogative: poses a question

Do you like chocolate, too?

Exclamatory: exclaims something; expresses a strong or heightened emotion

You must! Chocolate is the best treat ever!

FAQ....

How can I tell the difference between a declarative sentence, an imperative sentence, and an exclamatory one?

Well, part of this is writer's choice. An exclamatory sentence is a more forceful version of a declarative statement, and is meant to convey excitement or another emotion.

So: Shut the window. (imperative because you are making a request) vs. Shut the window, there's a bear! (exclamatory because you are panicked about bear-attack).

What does this look like on your test?

When you are confused, consider the whole sentence (for clues) and <u>evaluate</u> the purpose of the sentence. Does it NEED to be exclamatory? Under what conditions would it be so?
